Tucker first opened her eyes in the Mineral Wells candy and treats. She lost her hearing at 5 due to a section of Mississippi close to the Tennessee border fever, but she continued to attend the local school in in March 8, 1917. And the 95-year-old remembers many of those changes and much of the history she's seen in her lifetime.

The Deaf world has changed since Annie M. in the county and loved to walk to the store to buy Mineral Wells, Mississippi. Then, when she was 9, she went with her favorite aunt on the train to Jackson, Mississippi. This was when Annie found out that she was to live at the school for the deaf. Annie to go home during the school year, but she didn't mind because she loved it at school. She was very popular, and wanted to become a home economics teacher. She played on the girls' basketball team and even earned a letter.

While at the Mississippi School for the Deaf, a cocky, good-looking young football player from Gallaudet, caught her eye. It wasn't long before the young man, Theodore W. Tucker, from Colorado stole her heart and they married on March 10, 1937. The young couple moved to Kansas City soon after, and then to Denver in the 1940's. Annie did not graduate from the deaf school.

Annie raised a family of 5 children and is a grandma or great grandma to 28 grandchildren. But she also considers the deaf people of Colorado as part of her family. They love her. 


